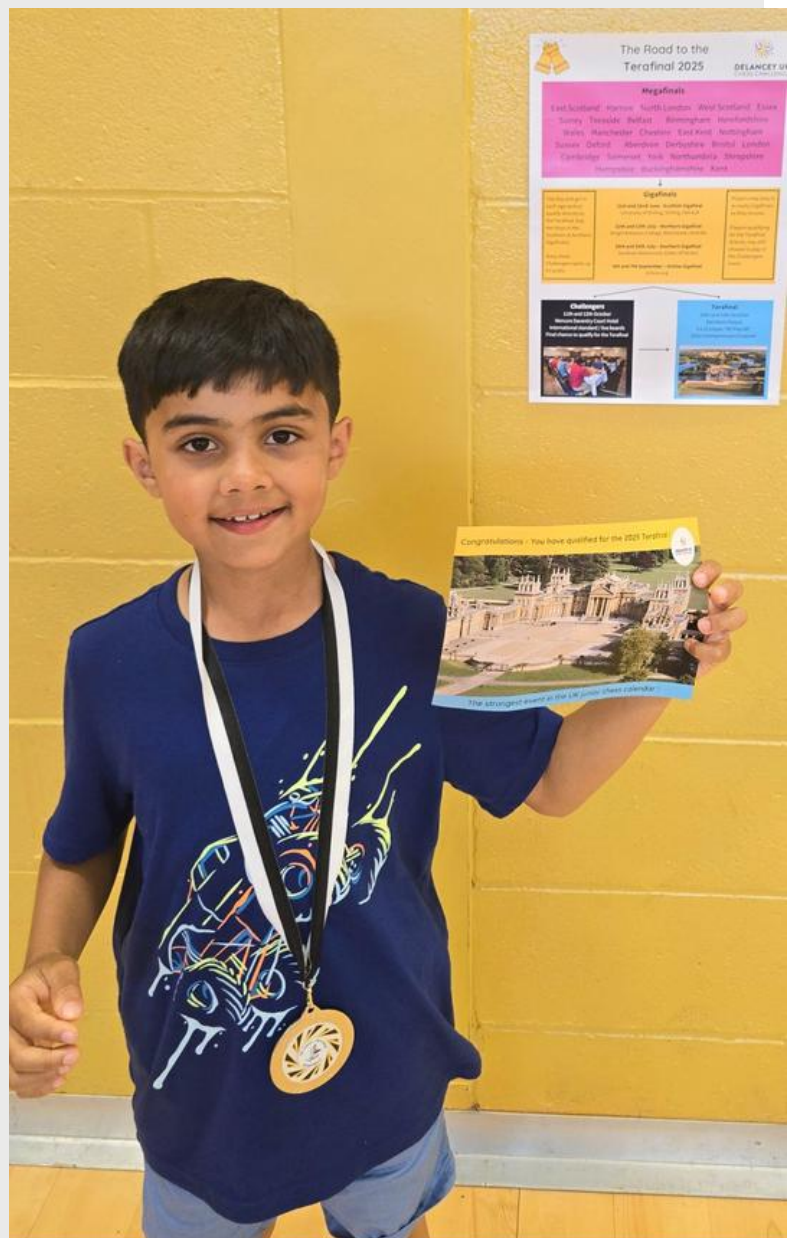

# LAST EVER CURD CORNER

The collection of printer cartridges, toners and mobile phones at school will end on Monday 21st July, as well as used stamps for the British Hedgehog Preservation Society. From this date, only plastic bottle tops will continue to be collected for the SchoolCycled scheme.

However, you can continue to recycle printer cartridges locally at Ickenham Library in aid of Tiggywinkles Wildlife Hospital. The box is on the right as you enter, by the trophy cabinet.

The recycling schemes have been very successful over the past few years, raising a grand total of over £2,800. Over 650kg of rubbish previously heading for the bin has been recycled with Terracycle. The money has gone towards running gardening clubs and improving our outdoor areas for lessons. Items like the wildlife camera have been purchased with these funds to show the children what comes into our school grounds. The British Hedgehog Preservation Society has also received over 11kg of used stamps to raise funds.

An additional grant from Groundwork UK in association with Bupa has meant the pond area could be rejuvenated to become a better resource for science lessons. Funding from the Co-op meant we were able to purchase a new greenhouse. Unfortunately, Storm Darragh struck in December 2024 but we are awaiting a replacement during the summer holidays.

Thank you for your support with the recycling and fundraising over the past few years. Without your toothbrushes, biscuit wrappers and other items, many of these things would not have been possible.

A Message from Mr Barnieh:

As we approach the end of the school year, I wanted to take a moment to reflect on the significant progress we've made as a school community. Since OPAL was introduced, we have transformed the playground into a vibrant and stimulating space with at least eight different zones. These diverse zones offer a range of activities that cater to all interests and abilities, encouraging creativity, teamwork, and independent play.

This transformation has had a profound impact. We have observed a noticeable reduction in playtime incidents, as children are more engaged and invested in their activities. The zones encourage responsibility, as the children take greater care in managing their equipment and tidying up after themselves. The variety of play options means that every child can find something that excites them, promoting inclusion and positive social interactions.

Miss Griffiths and Mrs Bhardwaj have been instrumental in this progress, providing continuous support and quickly rolling out new zones to keep the playground fresh and engaging. It is inspiring to see the children's faces light up as they explore and enjoy these new spaces.

Knowing that we are only halfway through this exciting journey makes the progress all the more rewarding. The positive changes on the playground are a testament to the power of play and the vision Mrs Penney and the team have for fostering a nurturing and dynamic environment for our children.

### Parking for Assemblies and Productions

I wanted to take the opportunity to explain the rationale regarding parking at assemblies and year group performances.

The reason we permit parking on site for class assemblies but not for year group productions is due to the length of time the performances take. A class assembly is often no longer than 30 minutes, with time afterwards for photos and congratulations, etc. So all cars belonging to parents attending have left the playground by our first round of scheduled play times. Year group productions are longer, often lasting an hour and then with photos and congratulations, this overlaps with break times and we have to consider the safety of the children.

### Parent Parking Pledge at Glebe Primary School

The idea is simple, in return for making the pledge and agreeing to follow some basic principles set out below, your car can carry a sticker that tells the world you are doing your bit to make a difference.

The Hillingdon-wide principles are:

- I agree to help my child / children travel actively at least once a week
- I agree to drive with consideration for others
- I agree to park away from the school gates
- I agree to never block a driveway
- I agree to turn off my engine when parked

In addition, we would ask Glebe parents, guardians & carers to agree to the following Glebe specific principles.

- I agree to never stop on the yellow School Keep Clear zig-zag lines outside the school during restricted times.
- I agree to support my child's road safety education by using safe crossing points, such as the Zebra crossing, and following the Green Cross Code.

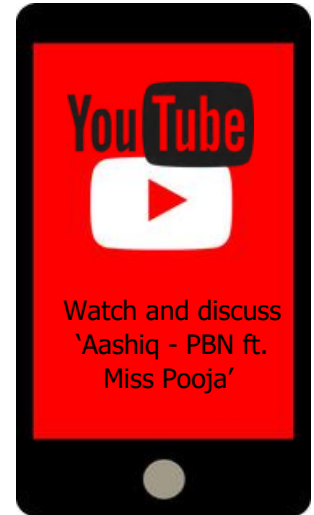

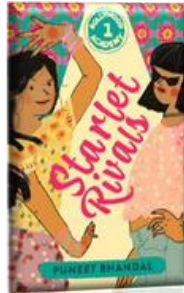
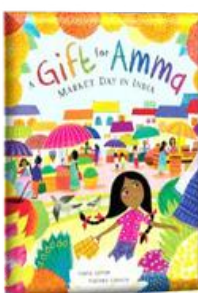

# 10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators

## STAYING SAFE AROUND WATER

Enjoying time in, on, and around water plays a vital role in a young person's overall development, offering a healthy and exhilarating way to have fun. This guide outlines essential safety advice, based on the Royal Life Saving Society UK's Water Safety Code, to help ensure children can enjoy swimming and similar activities safely and responsibly.

### 1 STICK TO LIFEGUARDED AREAS

It's never advisable to enter unsupervised bodies of water, especially alone. Instead, it's considered best practice to accompany children to places with lifeguards, as they will be trained to respond swiftly in emergencies and provide first aid when needed.



### 2 LEARN SIGNS AND FLAGS

When going to a new environment, it's important to research the local area and make children aware of safety signage before entering the water. If visiting the seaside, make sure children are always supervised by an adult and that they know what different beach flags mean, so they're knowledgeable of where and when they can enter the sea.



### 3 STOP AND THINK

Young people should be cautious before entering water, as it's difficult to know what hazards could be underneath. Use the Water Safety Code and encourage children to ask themselves questions such as, "Is the water too deep or too shallow? Are there currents, tides, or underwater objects?" Make sure children know never to enter water from a height, as what lurks below could cause serious injuries.



### 4 CONSIDER WATER TEMPERATURE

Even on hot days, water can be deceptively cold. Tragedies strike when young people experience cold water shock. Never let children enter water quickly; instead, ensure that they enter slowly and carefully to allow their bodies to adjust to the temperature or exit easily if needed.



### 5 INFLATABLE SAFETY

Although inflatables may seem like a fun idea when visiting locations like the beach, they can float further out from shore and into more dangerous water. It's advisable only to use inflatables in spaces like appropriately managed swimming pools, where they're used in more controlled and supervised environments.



### 6 SUPERVISION IS KEY

For young children, and particularly those under the age of five, it's important for them to be supervised at home, outside and at the pool at all times. It's essential for parents and educators to understand that young children can drown quickly and silently; therefore, anyone supervising them must maintain constant watch in case they get into difficulty.



### 7 DON'T GO TOO FAR

When swimming, especially in open water, it's best to teach children to stay within a safe depth. Share advice with them such as only entering water up to a standing depth, and in the case of visiting the beach, swim parallel to shorelines. This will allow a child to stay in control and get out of the water easily.



### 8 KEEP POOLS AND TUBS DRAINED

For parents of young children, a simple way to protect them at home is to keep outdoor spaces and bathrooms tidy after playtime. This includes removing water from paddling pools after use and turning them over, returning lids to hot tubs and taking toys out of baths, so all water can be fully drained from the tub.



### 9 FLOAT AND CALL 999

If a child gets into difficulty in the water, they should try to float on their back, stay calm, and call for help. If a young person sees someone else in trouble, they should dial 999 or 112 immediately, then shout to reassure their friend, encouraging them to float on their back, and letting them know that help is on the way. Children should never enter the water to attempt a rescue or retrieve belongings.



### 10 TEACH WATER SAFETY

Beyond swimming lessons, children should be educated in school on water safety. Use RLSS UK's accredited programme, 'Water Smart Schools', which offers free lesson plans and resources on how to be safe on, near and around water by following the Water Safety Code.

**Most disputes never get to court and are resolved by some form of negotiation.**

Mediation is a process that actively assists you to negotiate an agreement that is workable for all concerned, A mediator helps the process of negotiation by:

- > Bringing parties to a point where they can negotiate
- > Helping both sides to identify practical ways forward
- > Keeping the negotiations on track
- > Ensuring that the ways forward identified feel fair to everyone involved

...and because mediated agreements are negotiated rather than imposed on either party, they are more likely to be workable in practise and stuck to by all involved. (You can even make your mediated solution the basis of a legally binding agreement if necessary).

Over 80% of disputes that go to mediation are resolved. It is no wonder that the government and courts actively encourage you to try mediation before embarking on costly and difficult legal action. For some disputes, you will need to have met with a mediator before you can embark on legal action.

**Dispute resolution with your best interests at heart**

Mediation offers the freedom to discuss solutions without the worry of proposals and options later being used in legal action. Discussions are also confidential\*.

Mediation is normally a fraction of the cost in both time and money of pursuing matters solely through a legal route.

It gives you the support of an expert in resolving disputes whilst keeping you in control of decisions that will affect your life and those closest to you.

Should you not be able to resolve matters through mediation, you still have the option of litigation if you wish. Nothing said in mediation can then be used against you in court\*.

**How mediators work**

A professional mediator is an expert in dealing with disputes. They can:

- > Help you sort out the important issues to be discussed
- > Give impartial information on the sources of help and advice you may need
- > Tackle the obstacles to reaching a workable way forward.

**What we do**

We will talk to you individually to establish your different points of view and clarify how best we can help the situation. If we don't think mediation will be of help we will tell you.

**If your case is suitable for mediation...**

**We can offer:**

- > Round table meetings, with all parties present, together with facilities to talk separately with the mediator if required.
- > Shuttle mediation - with separate rooms for clients and the mediator moving between rooms discussing information separately.
- > Child Consultation - we can arrange to see children individually or with siblings to establish their views and help to develop parenting plans (with parental consent).

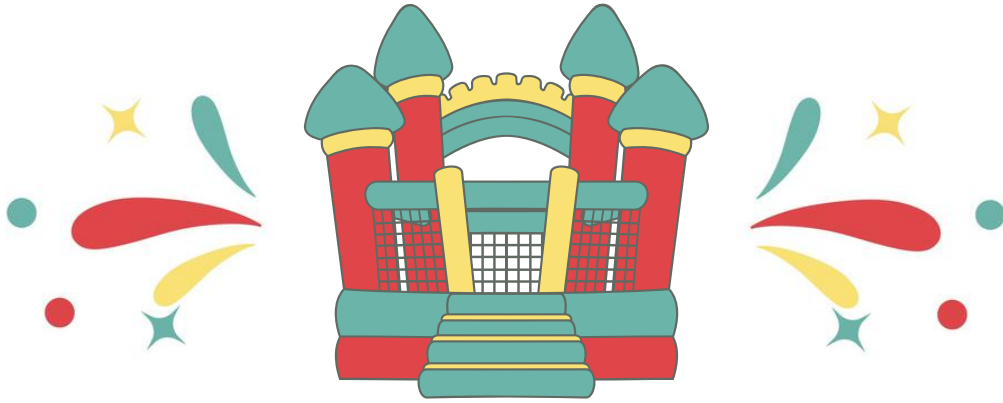

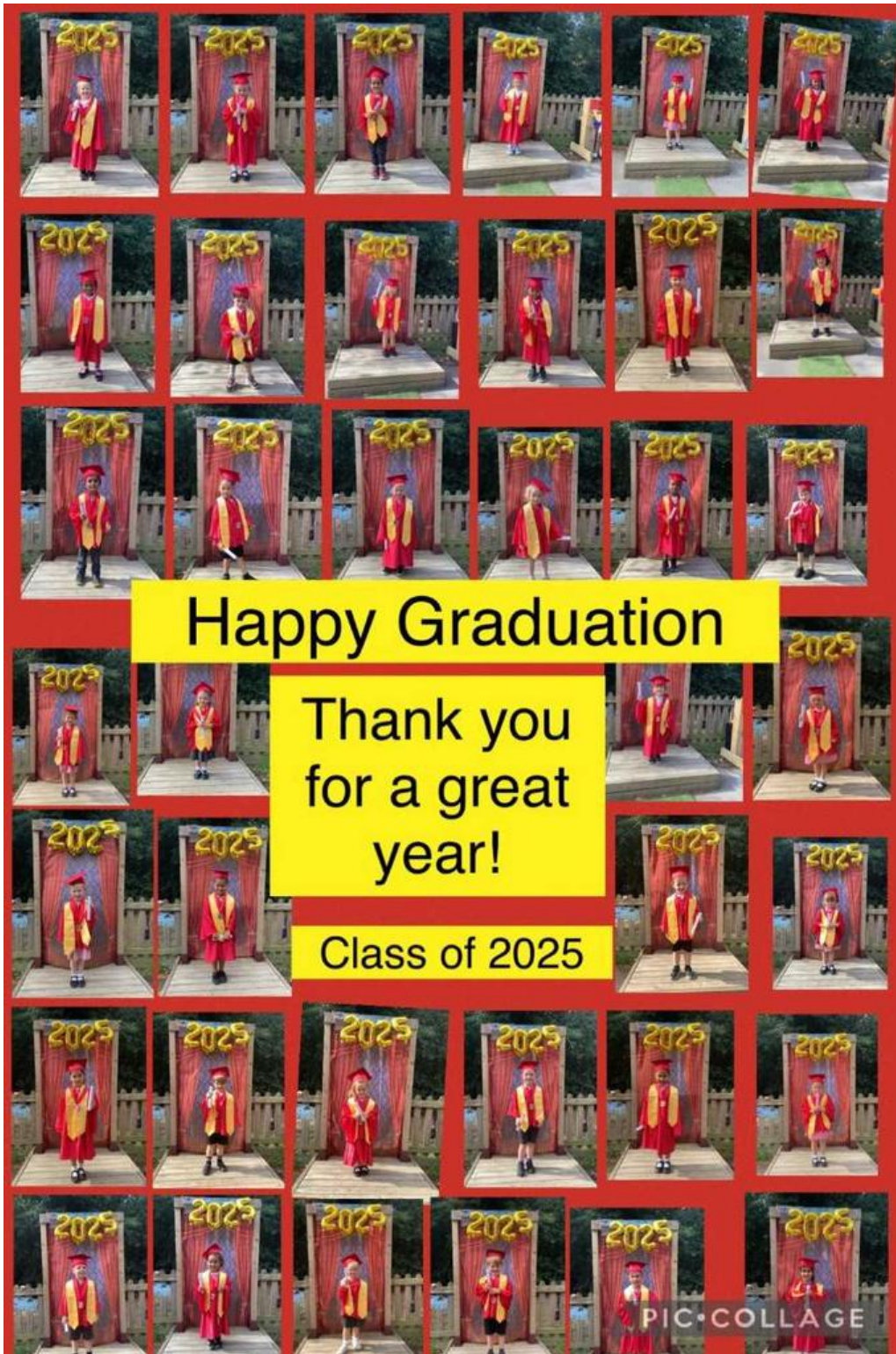

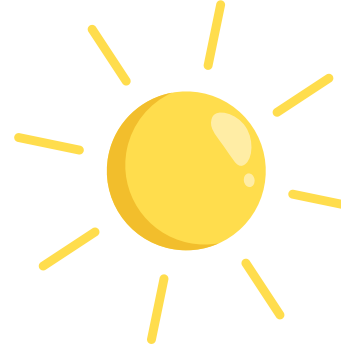
